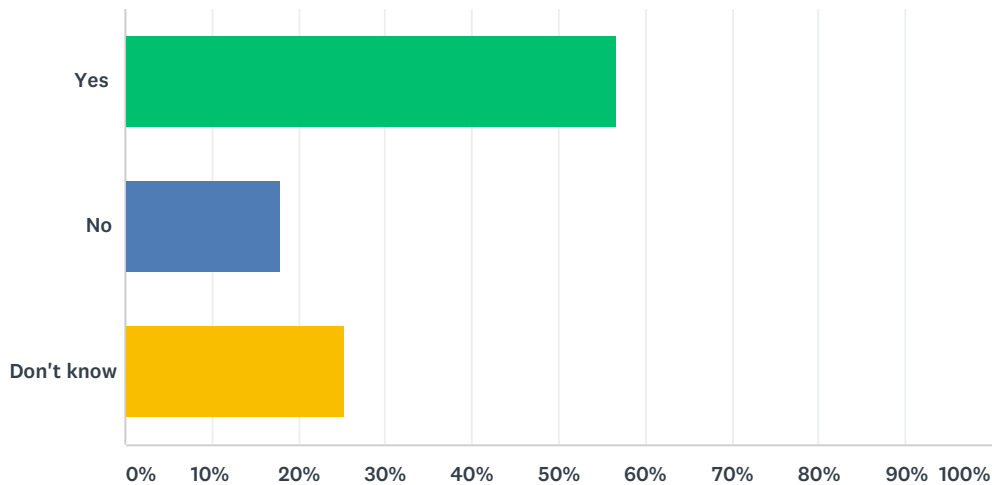


## Q8 Is it important for community groups to be able to manage community facilities themselves?

St Andrew's church in Cullompton developed a £1.8M community centre with absolutely no funding from MDDC. It set up an operations and maintenance company to manage the facility and it was extremely careful in terms of the community benefit to be delivered (given the funding commitment from DCC and SWRDA). This has been a massive success story - so community groups can manage community facilities but the cost of running such facilities and maintaining them should not and must not be underestimated over the whole lif of that asset.
